Harmony Dog Rescue: Helping Dogs in Crisis

Timothy Lydon is a Wilkinsburg resident, who saw a need: People experiencing crisis who needed emergency dog care. Lydon decided to step up and meet that need.

In 2023, he and Molly McAleer founded Harmony Dog Rescue, a non-profit. "Our mission is to provide safe homes for dogs whose owners are experiencing homelessness, domestic violence or medical emergencies," he said.

"Victims of domestic violence who wish to escape unsafe situations are often faced with the decision to either seek their own safety and leave their dogs at risk, or stay and protect the dog while continuing to live in danger themselves," he added.

Another situation that requires emergency dog care is when an individual

who is experiencing homelessness must be hospitalized. It can be difficult for those people to keep their dogs in that situation. Yet, as Lydon explained, they "rely on their dogs for companionship, affection and someone to love and nurture." Having their pet returned to them when they are able is very important.

Harmony Dog Rescue helps those who would otherwise be forced to surrender their pets because of a crisis.

A couple years ago, Lydon worked at the Humane Animal Rescue of Pittsburgh and he really enjoyed helping people solve their pet problems.

"We had a helpline that people could call to seek advice, and this my favorite part of the job. The hardest problems to solve were the ones that involved emergency boarding," said Lydon.

The average animal rescue does not have the capacity to meet every emergency need. "It made sense to start an organization dedicated completely to providing temporary foster care for dogs," said Lydon.

The first two dogs that Harmony Dog Rescue took in were due to a domestic violence situation. The victim had called the police, who arrested the abuser for another crime he was involved with. The couple ended up losing the house, and the victim ended up homeless with her two dogs. While homeless, she ended up getting addicted to heroin for which she had to go to rehab. In the meantime, she needed care for her dogs.

The primary objectives of the rescue are to make sure dogs are not left in dangerous situations and that fewer of them are surrendered to shelters. And the ultimate goal is to reunite dogs with their owners.

While Harmony Dog Rescue is based in Wilkinsburg, they are leasing land in Zelienople in Harmony Borough. They are raising money to build a kennel on that land in hopes that operations will move there.

Lydon said that he has appreciated the support that he has gotten from Wilkinsburg. "We've had people from the community reach out to volunteer for us and we're so grateful for this."

Disposal of Oversized Garbage Cans

With the City of Pittsburgh sanitation no longer picking up garbage cans with a volume larger than 35 gallons, many residents have asked how they should dispose of larger cans that they can no longer use.

City sanitation crews will remove such cans provided that residents 1) place the empty oversized cans at the curb on their regular trash day; 2) clearly mark the oversized trash can with a note reading "Take Can"; 3) make sure that the oversized can is empty. The city will not pick up trash in cans that are over 35 gallons in capacity.

Free Museum Admission for Black History Month

That CATT & Tuskegee Airmen Museum in Wilkinsburg is offering free admission for Black History Month. The museum is open every Saturday and Sunday in February, 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Visitors to the Center for Aviation Technology and Training (CATT) will learn about the Tuskegee Airmen by viewing The Black Wings exhibit currently on loan from the Smithsonian Institute. The exhibit chronicles the story of African Americans, who, despite facing racial barriers, attained great achievements in the world of aviation. Activities include a cockpit flight trainer, a praxinoscope, a land-the-plane maze, wearable wings, airport play table, and an outdoor play space.

The Tuskegee Airmen Museum is located at the Sherwood Event Center, 400 Sherwood Rd. in Wilkinsburg.

Borough Council off to Fast Start in 2024

Wilkinsburg Borough Council began 2024 with a mandatory organization meeting on January 2.

Boroughs are required to hold such organizational meetings on the first Monday (Tuesday this year due to the New Year's holiday) in January, following a year in which there was a municipal election.

During the meeting, three new Council members and one re-elected member were sworn in by Judge Iren Evans, with Mayor Dante Comans presiding.

Councilwoman Linda Atkins (1st Ward) was sworn in for her second term after being reelected in November 2023.

The new council members include Renee Haynes-Johnson (1st Ward), Moses Workman (2nd Ward), and Natisha Washington (3rd Ward).

The Council also elected new officers at the organizational meeting. William Smith, III (1st Ward) was elected Council President. Renee Haynes-Johnson was elected Vice President. Linda Atkins was elected president pro tempore.

At the January 17 Legislative meeting, Council approved advertising its 2024 meeting schedule.



Business Spotlight: Vickey's Soul Grill



The Pittsburgh region isn't known for its Southern-style cooking, but Vickey Giddens of Vickey's Soul Grill is going to change that.

"My family is from Crystal Springs, Mississippi, and my father was a chef," says Giddens. "When I was 6 years old, I watched my father, and I let that be my dream, to be a chef like my dad."

How did this Mississippi native end up in Pennsylvania? Giddens thought the region would bring great learning opportunities.

"Believe it or not, Pittsburgh has a lot of culinary schools. My passion for being somewhere brand-new drew me to love it here, so I went to the University of Pittsburgh and took classes at Katz Graduate School of Business in the Health Department discipline. I was just so eager to learn."

In addition to Giddens' talent and drive, she credits her success to the Idea Foundry, a program that "takes your ideas and brings them into reality." Founded in 2002, Idea Foundry is a Pittsburgh-based global investor focused on social impact.

"They took my vision, dream, and goals and brought them to life. They got me a little kitchen inside the Y in McKeesport, and that's when it started to prosper from there. They saw that this woman really has something! People were flocking to me like never before."

The Idea Foundry connected her with Happy Valley Lunch Box, which helps entrepreneurs pursue their dreams. She worked with Lunch Box to grow Vickey's Soul Grill, where she completed six weeks of training "to blossom in the right way."

"My soul food isn't fly by night. It's legit and done professionally. Soul food has a bad rap, that you cook with a lot of fatty things. Not so. I know how to reach your taste buds without all that extra stuff involved. I use the proper seasonings and herbs for each dish. Plus, each one of my items has its own equipment. I don't want to eat French fries and have them taste like fish."

Giddens says she does a lot of food research and even visits other establishments to compare. In addition to serving delicious Southern homestyle cooking, she believes Vickey's Soul Grill has a lot to offer to the community.

"You have to have real customer service skills and a passion for your food. I aim to please my guests. I'm one-on-one with my customers and love everyone I come in contact with. If something is not right, it'll be right before you leave this establishment."


