Jeanne Drennan: Making Wilkinsburg a Greener, Sheltered Place





Next month, the Wilkinsburg Shade Tree Committee will recognize Jeanne Drennan for her long-standing dedication to the health and success of our Borough's shade trees. The committee will host a tree planting dedicated to Jeanne, in recognition of her work over the past decades.

In 1993, Jeanne was invited to serve on the newly formed Citizens' Advisory Committee on Shade Trees, informally known as the Wilkinsburg Shade Tree Committee, and the new committee soon drafted the language for the Borough's

Get Ready to Celebrate a Big Borough Birthday!



2024 will be an exciting year for the Wilkinsburg Public Library, which is celebrating its 125th anniversary.

They have just started planning a celebration for this coming September 14.

The library started out as a branch of the Carnegie Library of Braddock which was opened on September 11, 1899, in one room of the McNair School.

It was opened by Fred Evans. The library had 1,500 books and circulated 104 books the first day it was in operation. In the first year 58,225 books were circulated.

In 1900, a second room and a second staff person were added.

In 1921, the Braddock librarian notified the Wilkinsburg Borough Council that the Carnegie Library of Braddock could no longer endow the branch libraries and maintain their own. They were willing

Garbage Cans More than 35 Gallons **Prohibited**

The Borough reminds residents that as of last summer, the City of Pittsburgh sanitation stopped picking up garbage cans larger than 35 gallons.

Receptacles that are larger than 35 gallons will not be collected by City garbage crews. While the vast majority of residents are now compliant with this requirement,

there are still residents who persist in placing cans over 35 gallons on the curb for pick up. The city will not collect garbage in those cans.

Borough Looks to Spring with GA Cleanup, EVs And New Parking Lot

The Borough is prepared to welcome Spring in March, accepting delivery of the Borough's first electric vehicles (EVs), announcing the date for this year's Great American Cleanup, and completing two projects that were part of Phase I of the Borough Building rehabilitation initiative.

Great American Cleanup, April 20

The Great American Cleanup will be on Saturday morning, April 20, a few days before Earth Day on Monday, April 22. Last year's clean up was rained out so the Borough hopes to make this year's Great American Cleanup event the biggest yet, topping past events in number of participants, projects, and volume of trash collected.

Cleanup Day is a great way to spend time with neighbors, meet new friends, and help improve our neighborhoods.

Residents can participate as individuals or as part of a group-two or more people—who want to register a project. A project can be as focused as a pair of neighbors working for a few hours to clean up their block or even just a street

The Borough will also host its next **Electronics Recycling** day on Saturday morning, April 20, at the Department of Public Works.

EVs Join Borough Vehicle Fleet

At the December 20, 2023, Council meeting, Council authorized purchase of the first electric vehicles to join the Borough vehicle fleet.

In January, the Borough took possession of three Hyundai Ioniq sport utility vehicles.

The three EVs will replace 2009 and 2014 Ford Focus sedans that were due for replacement in the Code Enforcement Department fleet and provide a vehicle for the Police Department social workers.

The vehicles were purchased using American Recovery Program funds. Working in partnership with Duquesne Light's Fleet Advisory team, the Borough was able to benefit from grants and rebates that reduced the net cost of the EVs to less than comparable vehicles with internal combustion engines.

> As the Sun went to press, the vehicles have been outfitted with Borough livery and only wait receipt of license plates to begin service. You should see them on Borough streets in early March.

Purchase of the EVs was one of the significant benefits of the Borough Building parking

lot reconstruction project, which was completed in mid-February. The project was begun during the summer and resulted in a total reconstruction of the lot.


The lot serves as parking for the Wilkinsburg Police Department and Code Enforcement Department vehicle fleets and for Borough staff parking. The lot is also the location of the external entry into the police station.

The project included installation of the Borough's first EV charging stations, purchased with grants and rebates provided by the state and by Duquesne Light. Duquesne Light's Fleet Advisory team provided essential guidance to the Borough to purchase and install the charging stations.

The lot's surface and parts of its base had badly deteriorated over the decades it has been in operation, and the lot's layout did not make optimal use of the space, impeding traffic flow through the lot.

The reconstruction project regraded the lot, optimizing the space to accommodate significantly more vehicles and enabling more efficient traffic flow.

The new treated aluminium fence (pictured above) is both decorative and provides a level of security that had been previously lacking. The reconstruction project also included new LED lighting for the lot.





Metro Community Health Center's School-Based Mobile Clinic Program

Metro Community Health Center (MCHC), a non-profit organization serving people of all ages and backgrounds, has partnered with Wilkinsburg School District (WSD) to better integrate healthcare services into Wilkinsburg's schools.

The purpose of this partnership is to provide not only basic medical care and preventive services, but also to emphasize the link between health and academic success.

Integrating health services into the school system helps to reinforce the idea

that healthy students perform better academically and can reach their full potential.

Through this collaboration, students and their families will have access to a range of medical services including dental care, state-mandated screenings, comprehensive health care, and mental health support.

This initiative also aims to reduce absenteeism by providing convenient access to healthcare for students, relieving parents and guardians from having to take time off work.

MCHC's mobile clinic, "Heals on Wheels" (HOWie), makes accessing these services easy. HOWie, a 38-ft RV, features two private fully-equipped exam rooms, a small waiting area, a bathroom, a wheelchair lift, and a lab area.

It functions like a regular doctor's office, assisting with scheduling and post-appointment care.

HOWie will visit Kelly Primary and Turner Intermediate alternately.

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

The current committee members are devoted to preserving the vision and hard work that she fostered by continuing to assess and maintain the canopy, plant new trees, advise and educate the Borough government and residents, and generate interest in our urban trees.

to give Wilkinsburg the 10,000 book collection, the library equipment, and the operating staff, which consisted of three people at the time.

The Wilkinsburg Council gratefully accepted the offer, and since August 1921 the library has been administered by the Borough of Wilkinsburg. The name was officially changed to The Wilkinsburg Public Library on October 15, 1926.
